Council News HMS Cricket Memorial | Green Flag Award

CRICKET CAMP MEMORIAL

It has been an honour and a privilege for several years to lay a wreath on behalf of Hedge End Town Council at the Memorial at Cricket Camp, Manor Farm Country Park.

HMS CRICKET

COMBINED OPERATIONS AND
LANDING CRAPT BASE

1943-1946

To honour the memory
of those members of the landing craft creek
who sailed from this base and gave their live,
during the D-Duy landing in Normandy
and in later searborns operations

Also to commemorate
the still part played by all personnel from
HMS Cricket in the liberation of Europe
and the final victory

It commemorates the part this area played in the D Day landings (6 June 1944). Few people know how important this camp was and the preparations that went on at Cricket Camp. Being close to the River Hamble made it an ideal place for men and landing craft to prepare for D Day.

[During the Second World War, Manor Farm was the base for HMS Cricket (1943-1946). HMS Cricket was the secret training base for the flotilla of landing craft taking men, tanks and supplies across the channel from Warsash and Hamble. After the war, its many buildings were used to house local people.]

Last year's ceremony was even more poignant, being attended by a family from Bournemouth, a member of which lost a brother at the camp when a flying bomb fell on the site, killing several service personnel.



The memorial is very striking and although somewhat tucked away, is well worth a visit to remember the part our area played in such an important part of WWII and the lives given for our

country, that we may live in peace.

Everyone is welcome to the ceremony. Let's hope this year it may be a fine day! (For anyone wishing to attend, please email: francis-nimmo@outlook.com during October, when this year's date will be finalised.)

On the 18 July, a record number of parks and green spaces collected a Green Flag Award. Albert Road Cemetery and the War Memorial Garden in Albert Road and St Johns Road respectively, have been recognised by the Green Flag Award Scheme as one of the very best in the world.

The cemetery and garden are among a recordbreaking 1,797 UK parks and green spaces that will today receive a prestigious Green Flag Award - the mark of a quality park or green space.

This international award, now into its third decade, is a sign to the public that the space boasts the highest possible environmental standards, is beautifully maintained and has excellent visitor facilities.

Frank Mortimer MBE | Tree Warden's Report

REMEMBERING FRANK MORTIMER, MBE (1916 – 2017)

Frank Mortimer MBE passed away peacefully on 30 July 2017, at the remarkable age of 101 years. Although his final years



residing in Totton, Southampton, Frank will be remembered most fondly by those who remember both his work and community spirit in Hedge End.

Frank joined Hedge End Parish Council as an elected Councillor in 1983 and became Chairman of the Council in 1986 and continued his services to the community until the early 1990's. In 1987, he was also a serving Borough Councillor.

His dedication and long association to the Bonhomie Holiday Centre, purpose built for the disabled in Dodwell Lane and now a Registered Care Home with nursing that specialises in caring for those suffering from sensory impairment, physical disability, brain injury and people with mental health and complex needs.

In 1997, Frank was awarded the MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours for services to Disabled People in Southampton, Hampshire. He was heavily involved with those less able in the city of Southampton for over 42 years and in 1964 led the formation of the Southampton & District Spina Bifida & Hydrocephalus Association, known today as Shine South. He was also President of the Federation of Clubs for the Disabled, Southampton Branch.

More recently, at the age of 100 years, Frank was interviewed by Sky News on the 80th anniversary celebrating the first voyage of the liner Queen Mary in May 1936. Frank explained how he joined the ship shortly after its launch and worked as a chef on its transatlantic journeys. He spoke of meeting celebrities such as Charlie Chaplin and Laurel and Hardy aboard. He felt that he could talk to anyone,

rich or poor. He knew every part of the ship because he watched her being built. He described a wonderful life and marked the Queen Mary as one of the top experiences of his life, travelling every 12 days Southampton to New York meeting some wonderful people.

Serving Town Councillor, Alderman Cllr. Jane Welsh, recalls how she and Frank worked well together when she too was elected in 1983, "He was down to earth and worked hard for the community, together with this dedication and commitment to Bonhomie House and the Queen Elizabeth II Activity Centre."

TREE WARDEN'S REPORT

You may have read in the Summer Gazette about the plight of the Red Oak at Greta Park due to its fungal decay? This is only one of the problems trees have to face. During the last three months, they have been subjected to high temperatures, strong winds and heavy rainfalls. Anybody living near a Horse Chestnut (conker) tree will have noticed that the browning of the leaves started earlier this year and is more prolific.

The flowers have been blooming and I may be wrong, but they do not seem to have lasted quite as well and require a lot of water during the dry spell. There are people out and about gathering blackberries, some of the fruit crops are quite good whilst others are not. As I travelled around the countryside, there seemed to be fewer moths and butterflies and not such a variety as in the past, which is a shame as they brighten up many a dull day.

I was in Scotland for a short break recently and on one of the days out, we passed within miles of what is thought to be the oldest living tree in Britain - the Fortingall Yew, believed to be over two thousand years old! As I was on a coach at the time, this was the nearest I got to it. However, it is well worth investigating this tree to understand its magnificent history.



He tean Kettle and Cake Tea Room

The eagerly awaited Kettle and Cake tea rooms opened its doors on the 11 July 2017. Located at 1 Freegrounds Rd (previously Browns Hair Lounge), it's a lovely location to stop for a cuppa and slice of something nice whilst you shop in the village or meet up with friends! We caught up with busy husband and wife team, Helen and Pat Ramsey to find out more...

So who are Kettle and Cake? We are husband and wife Helen and Pat Ramsey, Helen is a self taught home baker (Cake). Pat makes a great cup of tea and is working on his Latte art (Kettle). We also have our son Jake and nieces Ellie, Faith and Annie working with us.

What's your vision? We hope to have a successful tearoom offering a wide range of home made cakes and freshly made sandwiches in a place that people find comfortable and relaxed enough to come back time and again.

What inspired you to open in Hedge End? We have a vintage caravan from which we sold Helen's cakes along with hot and cold drinks around the south coast - at various Ageas bowl shows, events and private hire functions and as a hobby this was very successful for us. The next step was to open a tearoom if we could find somewhere suitable. We had looked at buying an established tearoom but there was nothing available for sale that met our requirements. We wanted a village location and Hedge End suited us, as we knew the area. We heard that Browns Hairdressers were moving and the old Lankester and Crook building had everything we wanted.

What can customers expect when they visit? We hope they will feel welcomed and see we have used the space we have, to give them a comfortable environment to enjoy our produce and enable them to relax and chat with friends at their leisure (rather than being squashed in and pressed to order so we have a fast turnaround of tables). We have seen every age range from babies to great grandmothers - just shows that everyone loves a piece of cake!

What are your specialities and what's on the menu? Our specialities are our homemade cakes all of which are made by Helen with help from her sisters, we do use a



local home baker in Hedge End to supply us with our gluten free cakes and these have gone down very well. We also offer afternoon teas and cream teas along with freshly made sandwiches using local bakery Happy Toast, and our tea and coffee is supplied by Mozzo who are based in Southampton.

What has been the biggest challenge along the way? The biggest challenge has been getting the change of use from A1 (retail) to A3 (food). We had no idea what was required, so we had to do a lot of research and ask a few people we knew for guidance. At one stage, we thought we would not have the change of use granted and as we had already set our hearts on the property, we did fret for a bit. Our landlord was very patient and understanding and did not put us under any pressure to sign the lease before the change of use was sorted out. All in all, from our first contact with the landlord in January to actually signing the lease in April and opening in July, it has taken 7 months to reach our goal.

Where would we like to see the business in 5 years? Ideally we would love to be a thriving part of the Hedge End community and a place local residents feel is an integral part of their village life. A place people know and talk about, along the lines of Elsie's of Botley or Josie's of Bishops Waltham.

What are your opening hours? We open Tuesday to Saturday 10am -4:30pm, we are spacious enough to accommodate push chairs and wheelchairs. All our cakes are homemade. Our unique 'cake jars' have already proven to be a success and not only with the younger customers. We also use many local suppliers such as Happy Toast Bakery, Mozzo Coffee, Hill Farm Juice and Bere Dairy ice cream.

Community News GP Makes Queen's Birthday Honours List

LOCAL GP MAKES QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY HONOURS LIST

Doctor Ruth Padday has received a British Empire Medal, honouring her services to youth and health care.

Dr Ruth Padday BEM, who has been a partner at the Hedge End Medical Centre for almost 25 years, has been formally recognised in the Queen's Birthday Honours 2017 for her exceptional service to Youth and Healthcare.

Ruth was nominated for her contributions to the following charities and not-for-profit businesses:

TEENAGE DROP-IN CENTRE

For the last 21 years Ruth has run the Teenage Drop-In Centre (TADIC - now the Young People's Well-Being Service) in Hedge End, in her own time. Ruth founded the centre after being inspired by similar projects in the Netherlands. Ruth spent 18 months painstakingly lobbying for funding before establishing the charity in 1996.

TADIC sees around 1,400 young people per year and aims to promote and sustain the good physical health and emotional well-being of young people aged 11-19 within and around the Borough of Eastleigh, Hampshire.

JUBILEE SAILING TRUST

The Jubilee Sailing Trust (JST) is an international, United Nations accredited disability charity, promoting integration through the challenge and adventure of tall ship sailing. JST provides lifechanging adventures to people of all ages, backgrounds and levels of physical ability. Voyages change lives by improving self-esteem, building confidence and providing leadership and life skills.

Ruth has volunteered for JST for over nine years, and has been committed to the development of medical support for the JST for many years. She has been instrumental in encouraging other doctors to

help at the JST and, largely due to her enthusiasm, there is now a core of volunteer medical officers providing the JST with essential medical advice. In addition, Ruth provides a 24/7 telephone service which offers



guidance to the ship's crew when medical problems arise at sea.

FESTIVAL MEDICAL SERVICES

Festival Medical Services (FMS) is a not-for-profit registered medical charity, delivering high-quality medical services for events, including some of the UK's largest festivals. FMS provides quality medical services and all levels of medical care in a challenging environment. The charity supports projects around the world, as well as operating at major festivals such as Glastonbury and Reading in 'field-hospitals', which offer emergency medical treatment to over 178,000 people.

Ruth became involved in the charity 15 years ago, volunteering at Glastonbury festival as a GP. She has subsequently volunteered at other festivals including Reading and Bath and West show. True to her dedication to improving the services she is involved in,Ruth, her eldest son William and two friends took up the role of volunteer Doctors Co-ordinators for FMS in 2012; recruiting, scheduling, CRB-checking and managing teams of up to 107 doctors for over 10 festivals per year.

Dr Padday says: "I had no idea that I had been nominated by Jennie (Practice Manager at Hedge End Medical Centre) and my son, Will. I feel incredibly humbled by it all. There are so many incredible people doing incredible things and these charities wouldn't be able to do the life-changing



work that they do without them. I'm a small cog in these wheels and I have watched how lives have changed over the years because of these businesses and charities."

Jennie Dock, Practice Manager at Hedge End Medical Centre, who helped to put Dr Padday forward for the British Empire Medal, says "We've all admired Ruth for the fantastic work she does for charities and we're all baffled as to how she fits it all in. All of us are thrilled that she's been formally recognised for her dedication and hard work to making this world a better place for those with less opportunities or those in need. We can't wait to celebrate with Ruth along with her family and friends."
