As I write this report, the rain that we so needed has finally come back. The grass is getting greener and the plants have gasped with relief. All we can hope for now, is that the good weather can last throughout Autumn, as Winter will soon be here before you know it.

Our allotments have had extra loving care this year with the help of our new **Allotment Holder's Committee**. This is great news for us. They are all pulling together to make a community within themselves.

I am sure we all have personal memories of our loved ones who were caught up in this terrible war. To show that Hedge End wishes to mark the occasion, we have purchased two commemorative seats, one has been placed at the cemetery and the other one in our Memorial Garden in St Johns Road. We have also purchased two silhouette soldiers, which have been placed on the wall of the Town Council offices and a third, given to us by EBC, will be placed at the cenotaph and will have a place of honour on Remembrance Day.

It is very important that we, in Hedge End, remember the bravery of all those who fought, lived and died in the First World War and that we

will continue to honour all those who were affected both at home and oversees. Our Girl Guide organisations are also involved in our celebrations and have been working hard in preparation for Remembrance Sunday. I would like to thank everyone for their involvement.

Looking at the Sweet Chestnut trees in some areas whilst I have been driving around, it looks as if the chestnuts will not be very big this year due to the lack of rain at the right time.

HEDGE END CARNIVAL 2018

Another sell out Quiz heralded the start of Carnival Week in Hedge End. Drier weather this year enabled both the Dog Show and Children's Sports to go ahead for the first time since 2015. Plenty of dogs were brought along by their owners whilst a dozen children had a great time at the sports - everyone going home laden with prizes.

Following weeks of hot, dry weather the carnival was able to return to its spiritual home of the Recreation Ground to assemble and judge the entries in the procession. Our thanks and congratulations go to everyone that took part in the procession. Many invented a new game to occupy themselves as the procession made its way to Greta Park it was called "Spot the Spectator". The street collection came to just over £1000, less than half that collected last year.

Having spent more than usual booking top quality entertainment for the Gala Show, it was very disappointing to find them performing for 200 spectators rather than 2000. Despite the big losses made on Carnival Day, events such as the quizzes and sponsorship from Richmonds and Leaders estate agents mean that a profit has still been made allowing donations to be made to good causes.

One of those good causes is the **Senior Citizens Lunch which will be held at the Village Hall on Saturday 13 October 2018**. If you, or
someone you know would like to come, claim a
place by adding your name to the list held at the
front counter of Hedge End Post Office. The only
qualifications you need are that you live in Hedge
End and are over state pension age. Be quick as the
meal is limited to the first 100 applicants.

The Fantastic Firework Fiesta & Fun Fair is scheduled for Saturday 10 November 2018,

when 2017 British Fireworks Champions Selstar Fireworks will be back in Hedge End again. You can still watch their championship winning display online, but the real thing is a lot better. Remember that all carnival events are 'Walk To' and 'No Litter'

events. Make use of the free parking in your own driveway and bring a carrier bag with you to make it easy to take home your rubbish to dispose of properly.



Do not forget to claim your free raffle ticket from Holly our Carnival Queen and stay until the end to find out if you will be going home better off than when you arrived.

We are still hoping to see the carnival through to its 100th anniversary in 2021. However, at the moment the Gala Show held in Greta Park at the same time as the carnival is under threat. This is because there are no longer enough people prepared to help.

Please will you carry out an audit of what you do to make Hedge End a better place. If this leads you to conclude that you do not do enough or could do more, then there are tasks awaiting you - helping to keep the carnival show on track for a few more years!

The Hedge End Horticultural Society Volunteers

Serving the Community Award Winner 2017, Rita Elsey, has been an active member of the Hedge End Horticultural Society for over 20 years and has been working alongside the Hedge End Horticultural Society Volunteers (HEHSV) since the project first began. With the edition this year of the new flower beds and bug



boxes beside the Co-op car park, we just had to meet up with Rita to find out more about their ongoing work and future plans to brighten up the centre of Hedge End....

How long have the HEHSV been looking after the flower beds in the village centre?

It's been 6 years now since we first started. It took a while to get the permission we needed to tackle the beds, as there were a few health and safety concerns about us working in the village centre, however, after a bit of 'toing and froing' with the council, we finally got the go ahead. We were given a year, initially, to see how it went. We got such great support and feedback, that we are still doing it, 6 years later.

Whose idea was it to start the project?

Well, it was my idea initially. I would talk to my friends about how awful the flower beds looked in the centre of the village and we all agreed that they were a mess and that we wanted to do something about it. So, I approached the council with the idea.

How many volunteers help?

Myself and eight regular volunteers work together.

I really couldn't do it without them. We have other occasional volunteers who come along when we need a helping hand with the watering. As part of the Hedge End Horticultural Society, we are all members



of the Royal Horticultural Society, which gives us the insurance cover we need to work in the centre of the town.

How many hours a day / week do you tend to the beds?

I am here at least 3 times a week and as a group, we are here another 1 or 2 times a week. It's a constant battle of weeding, deadheading, watering, especially in this heat! We can spend anything up to 2 hours alone just watering.

Where do you get all of your plants? How is it funded?

The Hedge End Co-op have been fantastic. They suggested we put ourselves forward for their scheme which gives donations to local community projects like ourselves and we were amazed and thrilled to receive £1,400, which was incredible. This enabled us to buy a lot of the wonderful plants you see today.



Some of the plants are home grown. I must say a special thanks to volunteers Sue Barnes and Heather Jones, for regularly supplying us with some of their wonderful home grown plants!

We have received monetary donations from local shops, residents, councillors and the Hedge End West End and Botley (HEWEB) Local Area Committee. We often have a tin alongside us whilst we work in the village, if people want to donate when they pass by. Every penny is accounted for by our Treasurer, Rita Duell and every penny we receive is greatly appreciated as we are totally reliant on the kind donations that we are given.

We also hold a stall at the Hedge End Carnival. We sell plants to help raise funds and to highlight the work we are doing in the community. With all the funds we raise, we head off to our favourite garden centres to see what we can find to inspire us.

The Hedge End Horticultural Society Volunteers

Each year the planting gets more elaborate and unusual - Is it experimental? Can you tell us a bit about the plants you have chosen and why?

We all get together to brainstorm our ideas. No 'one person' could do all of this. It's all the volunteers together. I couldn't do it without them. Some of the volunteers have allotments, so we get lots of ideas from them.

Quite often, we see a plant at the garden centre and think, that would look fantastic! Then we often go away and research it, to see if it will really be suitable. A lot is experimental. Some things work better than others. We also try and have colour all year round. So, throughout the year, the beds always look different depending what day you pass. Do you know there are hellebore and tulips in the main flower beds that are still there from when the beds were originally planted? And they still look fabulous!

We try and go for plants that will attract the bees, butterflies and other pollinators. Colour is very important. At the moment, we have bright fuchsia campions, hybrid foxgloves, several varieties of salvia in different shades, then there is the crinodendron tree with its peach/orange flowers. Too many to mention, but we are always happy to answer any questions about the plants to passersby and anyone who is interested.

What comments do you get from passers-by?


We get some wonderful comments from people. They tell us how much they enjoy coming into the



Town Centre to see our beds which really is appreciated. The children are also taking a great deal of interest in our new bug boxes alongside the Co-op. I must thank our good friend Keith Barnes for building those out of recycled materials and old pallets from the Co-op.

What are the challenges of working on the beds in the village?

Watering is the biggest challenge. We are able to run a hose from the public toilets, but this can



still be incredibly time consuming. Also, the litter that continually appears in the village centre and in amongst the beds. I must give a special mention to Mike at Eastleigh Borough Council (EBC), who empties all the bins in the village centre every day. He asked special permission from EBC to take away all of our recycling and garden waste. We bag it all up at the end of the day and the next morning, Mike comes along and takes it all away for us! It's people helping us like this which really means such a lot to us. It's so appreciated, he is an absolute god send.

What has been your biggest success? What area are you most proud of?

We are really pleased with how the area alongside the Co-op is coming along this year. The area by the car park had been untouched for years and the amount of rubbish - bottles, tins, even clothes and the thick brambles, really made it a hard area to clear.

How can local residents help and get involved?

Because you have to be a member of the Horticultural Society to become a volunteer, donations are really the best way people can help us out. The ongoing support from donations really keeps us going and makes it worth while.

What's next? Any future plans? I have been told by the other volunteers that I am absolutely not to take on any more beds(laughs)! We really just cant cope. It takes such a long time and it's such hard work. We will just continue to maintain the ones we have already done.

Thank you to Rita and all the other volunteers for your hard work and dedication.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR (ASB)

During the summer months, we saw a natural increase in Anti-Social behaviour around Hedge End. We stepped up our patrols and conducted "high visibility" patrols in our hot spot areas. High visibility patrols are conducted when Police are made aware of a location that has various issues being reported. For example, at the moment Hedge End Town Centre is known to us as being a 'hot spot' for Anti- Social Behaviour. Your Neighbourhood Policing Team focuses more attention to this area by walking/ cycling around it. We also use our marked/ unmarked Police vehicles and utilise the various stores' cctv.

When it comes to ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR (ASB), we rely on calls from the public to identify locations/people or whole communities that need our help. If you yourself are a victim of ASB or come across ASB whilst out and about, we urge you to report this...
BY REPORTING ASB TO 101, YOUR CALL WILL BE OFFICIALLY LOGGED.

This means a member of your Neighbourhood Policing
Team will be made aware of your call and a visit (if
deemed appropriate) will be conducted. Our team is
committed to help make our communities better by
decreasing the impact/risk of ASB. Unfortunately,
sometimes we are not aware of issues which happen
around our area and by calling 101 we can help
identify people/ locations that need our help.

Police classify ASB into 3 sections. ASB PERSONAL, ASB ENVIROMENTAL and ASB NUISANCE. When you call ASB into 101, the call taker will classify your issue from one of the following sections:

ASB PERSONAL- Deliberately targeted at an individual or group or having an impact on an individual or group rather than the community at large. Example: Neighbour playing very loud music at their home address in the early hours of the morning.

ASB ENVIRONMENTAL- Where individuals or groups have an impact on their surroundings. Can include individuals who park abandoned vehicles, light pollution and noise. Example: Cars revving engine loudly or leaving an abandoned vehicle causing obstruction.

ASB NUISANCE- Where trouble, annoyance, inconvenience or suffering is caused to local community rather than to individual victims.

Example: Local group of youths loitering outside a shop who are swearing/ shouting/ littering.

COLD CALLING

Hampshire Police and Trading Standards want to remind people not to be pressured into signing up for services and goods that they don't actually need.

If you are ever visited or cold called by people offering services such as loft insulation or other 'energy home improvements' never be swayed into signing anything on the spot. If you feel uncomfortable and the person refuses to leave, tell them you are calling the police.

Older more vulnerable members of our community are being deliberately targeted and these companies are using scare tactics to get them to agree to totally unnecessary expensive work. They may also mention you are entitled to a Government grant, or you will be fined if you don't have the right energy saving measures in place. The 'sell' may start with a free loft insulation check.

If you have older relatives, friends or neighbours, please talk to them about <u>not</u> employing any services from people they are unsure of or who have cold called them. Trading Standards partners at the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline 03454 040506 can give advice, and will record complaints for Trading Standards.
