

Friday night is the busiest night on the streets of the UK according to Police. So, Hedge End Town Council recently met up with Frank Parker, Street Pastors Coordinator, to highlight the work being carried out on Friday evenings in and around Hedge End to support and benefit the local community...

#### Who and what are Street Pastors?

Street Pastors are a uniformed group of men and women from churches in the local area who are committed to showing that Christians care about what happens in our community. We operate in six teams of three mixed gender groups and we patrol key areas in Hedge End, West End and Botley on Friday evenings between 8pm and midnight. We wear blue coats and 'Street Pastors' baseball caps so we are easy to recognise.

#### Where do Street Pastors operate in the UK?

The initiative spread from London to other inner cities but is now being introduced in many rural locations too. There are now 200 locations across the UK with 8000 trained Street Pastors and a further 50 groups in the pipeline.

Where did the idea of Street Pastors come from? It originated in the London Borough of Brixton in 2003 by Les Isaac, a former Rastafarian and now a Baptist minister who was introduced to the concept by a group of church leaders in Jamaica. The aim was to have a direct presence on the streets to offer mentoring, practical support and care to the most disadvantaged neighbourhoods. How are Street Pastors funded?

Street Pastors are funded by grants from the Local Authority, the Police and also church donations. This covers our start-up costs, training and uniforms. All Street Pastors volunteer their time. How long have you been involved with the organisation and how did you get involved?

Two ½ years ago the Local Churches Together Committee was approached by Police Chief Inspector Diana Boyles, Eastleigh District, to consider setting up an initiative following an impressive fall in anti-social behaviour in other areas where the scheme had been introduced. I saw the real opportunity that Street Pastors would bring to the local community and got involved in the planning process.



#### Can local residents get involved with Street Pastors?

We love to have the support of residents when we are out and about and are able to pass their concerns on to the local authorities when we meet. To become a Street Pastor you need to be over 18 and have been a member of your local church for over a year.

#### What does your recruitment process involve?

All Street Pastors have to be Criminal Record Bureau (CRB) checked, then references are taken and interviews conducted. Successful candidates then undertake 50 hours of training over 12 weeks. They are put in teams of three with an experienced team leader. Police are fully supportive of our work and are aware when we are out on patrol. We coordinate closely with them closely and they give us guidelines on where there are any issues that we might help. What's an average Friday night like in Hedge End? We gather early to check equipment, uniforms and supplies and to coordinate with the Police. We then plan our routes and set off greeting everyone we meet. We visit the many parks and car parks in the area. When needs come up we offer help, be it simple first aid, offering water, referral cards to TADIC (Teenage Advice Drop-in Centre) or simply chatting and listening, offering a fruit pastille, waiting for parents to collect young people or offering a safe escort home if needed.

## How is your presence received by the young people you meet?

Where ever we go the young people we meet are always happy to stop and chat and welcome our support. We really enjoy meeting and chatting with these young people and hearing their stories. We hope to meet lots more people of all ages during these warmer, lighter evenings!

# Community News Hedge End From Village To Town

Hedge End Town Council met up with Steve Tanti, local bookseller and author of 'Hedge End, From Village to Town' to talk about life in Hedge End, his interest in local history and his love of books...

#### How long have you lived in Hedge End?

All my life. I was born at my Nan's house on Bursledon Road. It had a wonderful large garden, great for building dens! Kids don't do that sort of thing anymore do they?

#### What do you like most about Hedge End?

I love that you're not far away from the countryside. The old village centre is still the heart of the town for me; it still has that village feel despite Hedge End being such a large town now. My family all still live here, my kids have stayed here and my Nan too, she's 95 now but still as fit as a fiddle!

When did you become interested in local history?
I used to listen to my family telling stories when I was young and I'd look at their old photos and my interest grew from there. They would tell me about how rural Hedge End used to be with its many strawberry fields and farms in the area and I was

## When did you decide to write a book about Hedge End?


fascinated.

I started writing it in 2008. I talked to my family and made contacts through my Mum and Nan and I simply interviewed them over a cup of tea. I let them talk away about their memories and they shared their photos too. People used to pop into see me in my shop and give me photos and information.

## You run the book selling business above the Post Office?

I began selling 2<sup>nd</sup> hand books at book fairs but I wanted a more permanent base and I took on the space above the Post Office in Hedge End about 5 years ago. The books are mainly non-fiction; mostly local history, military history and transport.

You are now writing a new book on Hedge End?
The new book will be mainly photographic and postcard images of Hedge End. I had so many wonderful photos following the first book that I felt I needed to get them published for other people to



see. I am always interested in seeing more old photos and postcards of Hedge End if people would like to share them.

## If you could go back in time, is there a period or place in history that you would like to visit?

I would go back to c1900-1910. I'd visit Hedge End and Botley but I'd take my camera with me so I could capture how life really was back then and I'd bring the images back to the future with me of course!

## If you could change one thing in Hedge End what would it be?

I don't like the fact that when you mention Hedge End to a non- resident they always mention 'the superstores'. But there is so much more to Hedge End! We still have a busy village centre with good local shops too!

### You enjoy walking, what's your favourite local walk?

I love to walk from Hedge End to Botley, along The River Hamble, up through Manor Farm Country Park. I also enjoy the walk along Swanwick shore to Warsash and there is also a lovely walk along the disused Meon Valley Railway Line (Knowle - Alton).

#### What's your favourite book?

'Brendan Chase' by BB. Written in the 1940's, it's about three boys who run away to live as outlaws in the forest. They hunt, fish, climb trees and wear rabbit skins for clothes! My kids really enjoyed it too.

## If you could be someone else for a day who would you be?

I'd be the head of an archaeological dig somewhere in the UK, finding historical artefacts... fantastic!

A Day in the Life of ..

#### How did you get started in theatre?

I went to drama school and was an actor for a few years. I did theatre, radio, TV, both national and international and was always on the go. However, I started to get a bit bored of the constant touring and realised that the bit that really excited me was the rehearsal stage and seeing a new play come to life so I moved into directing.

## How did you become involved with The Berry Theatre?

I joined The Point, Eastleigh as Theatrical Director 19 months ago and that's when I learnt there was going to be a new theatre in the Borough. I was so excited at the prospect, I just couldn't wait to be involved. It's a real producing hub with lots of artists to connect with and exciting new projects, plus a real sense of community.

## What does The Berry Theatre bring to the community of Hedge End?

Entertainment right on its doorstep! A place for the community to come together and meet. It really is a high class venue with lots of local involvement including youth theatre, young writer's hub, disability groups and community plays. The Berry is distinct from The Point in that we focus on classic & popular drama, film and comedy. It's family friendly programming with a broad access for the whole community, but with emphasis on working with young people.

## What's an average 'Day in the life of a Theatre Director'?

There really isn't an average day! My day might start at 7.30am for a breakfast meeting but I can be here till 11.00pm watching a performance or rehearsal, so they are long days. I work really closely with the Theatre Programmer. We are sent hundreds of scripts to review each day from professional companies keen for us to put on their productions. So we spend a lot of time reading and deciding what to put on. I also have to meet with our hirers, complete funding applications and direct rehearsals. In the evenings I like to talk to the audience to

find out what they do or don't like. Our comedy nights are extremely popular as are our film nights. We have installed state of the art projection equipment. It really is top quality and we get fantastic feedback from audiences!

#### What's the most important thing you do each day?

There are two things really. Talk to my staff to make sure they are happy. I really have a fantastic team. Secondly, talk to the audience. This really is the best recipe for success.

## What advice would you give to anyone aspiring to work in the theatre?

Get involved as soon as you can, join a theatre group and really believe in it. You make your own success. Work really hard and really push for your ambition.

#### What's been your career highlight to date?

I have directed many plays and the true highlight for me is when I see the audience coming out happy. I like to stand and listen to the comments and when you get good feedback its wonderful.

#### Which actor would you like to work with?

I admire Samuel West which is why we asked him to open The Berry Theatre back in April. He really is an extraordinary force on stage. He takes on these huge roles and delivers them with intricate beauty and he has a real passion for theatre. We hope to get him back again as he was very impressed with the theatre.

#### Do you have a favourite place to visit in the local area?

I love visiting Netley Abbey and I would love to hold an outdoor performance there one day, watch this space!

## Hedge End Rangers F.C. Awarded Charter Standard Club Status!

Hedge End Rangers F.C. were formed in 1974 at which time they played their games on a cow field in Woodhouse Lane in Hedge End.

Since that time the Club has gradually grown in size and currently boasts 33 teams ranging from Under 8 to Under 18, three girls teams, and three men's teams. In total they have in excess of 475 players registered to play for their teams in various leagues throughout Southampton, Eastleigh and Winchester.

In addition, they also have their own Soccer School in conjunction with the Saints Foundation which is held every Saturday at Wildern School. Over 50 boys and girls of years R, 1, 2, and 3 attend the Soccer School each Saturday and have fun learning football, team games and individual skills with fully qualified Saints coaches.

Last season the Club discussed ways of improving both the players and parents experience of local football. They decided to apply to become a Charter Standard Club. This involved ensuring that each team had a minimum Level 1 coach who had also attended a Safeguarding Children workshop, was first aid qualified and had been CRB checked. Furthermore the players, spectators, coaches, managers and officers had to agree to follow their respective Codes of Conduct which helps to insure that everybody's enjoyment of the 'Beautiful Game' is improved.

After many weeks and months of hard work behind the scenes by Annette Bauck, the club's senior secretary, and after close scrutiny of paperwork by the Hampshire FA the Club were awarded Charter Standard Club status and were presented with the Charter Standard Club plaque at their home ground, Norman Rodaway Sports Field on 21st April 2011.

#### Tree Warden Report

The other morning I parked my car at the Bowls Club, removed my bicycle from the back and took a leisurely ride around Grange Park and Dowd's Farm. Stopping every now and then to look at the trees and shrubs that have been around for some considerable time. Some of the mature trees are well shaped and are looking really good, all being a slightly different shade of green. Each of the mature Oaks can be home to around 400 leaf eating insects which in turn can become food for insect eaters such as the Blue Tit and the Great Tit, birds most commonly seen feeding around in the foliage as I continued on my journey.

Turning right from Old Shamblehurst Lane to get to Dowd's Farm recreation area I was struck by the view from the path across the pond towards the school and to how clean, bright and healthy looking it was. The pond has all the makings of a tranquil place to sit and watch the wildlife around. The Housemartins flying overhead, the Starlings and Sparrows on the surrounding grass areas and the ducks both on water and on land as well as all the insects flitting about.

As I rested there for a short while enjoying the scenery an article that appeared in the Daily Echo during April came to mind concerning trees in peoples gardens and how they help the environment. On my way round I had seen so many houses with trees and shrubs, sometimes both appearing over the tops of the fences and walls, that I felt heartened to see so many Hedge End people are helping to sustain the wildlife that we are so fortunate to have.

Looking at the trees and shrubs around the recreation park I am very pleased to say all are looking healthy as did the whole area. On my way back to the car the cleanliness and general well being of the area makes one think it must be a healthy place to live and our thanks goes to the Groundstaff for the excellent job they are doing now for Hedge End Town Council.

#### Groundstaff Report



The Green Flag Awards inspectors were on site at Albert Road Cemetery and St John's War Memorial during May to inspect the sites for 2011/2012. Ken Hiscock, Groundsman, talks about his Green Flag preparation work:

Grass cutting at the cemetery takes a week to complete as I have to carefully mow and strim around each individual grave plot. I maintain the shrub beds, tidy the hedgerows and clean the seating areas but the trees are mainly left alone. I make sure that I time this work to coincide with the inspection so that it's looking its best when they visit. Unfortunately a few of our shrubs have been dug up and stolen recently which is a very sad shame.

The Green Flag Award is about site management, not just maintenance. It shows that you are looking at the environment; that you have thought about conservation. For instance, we only use peat free compost which helps preserve the UK's diminishing peat bogs and we encourage local wildlife too. We have bug and bird nesting boxes and have had two blue tit families this year. There are plenty of insects on site including ground dwelling bees and stag beetles. We also encourage wildflowers such as Bluebell and Primrose. Composting is also an important part of our conservation work and we have several bins recycling the green waste, which is then transferred down to the allotments.

It's really encouraging to get positive feedback from visitors and I am often thanked for the work we do which is very rewarding. The recent addition of the art deco archway at the entrance really adds to this unique site. The War Memorial at St John's is being included in the inspection this year and my colleague Danny France is carefully maintaining this important memorial for the community.

#### Re: A Little Bit Of History (Sunday's Hill)

In the last Gazette I was asked where the name Sunday's Hill originated and following a little research, offered an explanation about its origin as 'Sandy Hill' but asked if anyone else could add to this or correct me. I am really pleased to say that local resident, Shaun Towers got in touch -

"Quite by chance researching on the internet I came across the attached document (extract taken from Dodwell Lane Watching Brief by CKC Archaeology, 2000) and have copied a small section from page 5 below:

'Sunday's Hill seems to take its name from William Sunday, who held land in the area in 1550 that included 'Dodwelles' the probable predecessor of Dodwell Farm (Barstow 1994, 24)'

I prefer this explanation to the Sandy Hill one that you found."
